### **DIVISION OF NURSING DIRECTOR REPORT**

### I. Immunization Program

### 1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- **A.** 151 Hope World Wide reminder calls were made to parents of children between the ages of 19-35 months.
- B. Pfizer Infant/children electronic, telephonic reminder recalls January 15, 2015. 184 calls went out.
- C. Outreach clinic @ The Center on January 26, 2015. 32 clients were vaccinated.

### 2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- **A.** Staff attended the Mesquite College Fair on January 9<sup>th</sup> from 1:00-1:30pm at the Mesquite Library. Information on adolescent vaccines were given.
- **B.** Staff conducted a clinic at The Center for Behavioral Health on January 6, 2015. 12 clients were vaccinated.
- C. Staff conducted a Tdap clinic at Bright Horizons Child Care Center on January 23, 2015. 11 staff were vaccinated.
- D. Staff conducted an adult immunization clinic at HELP of Southern Nevada on January 30, 2015. 24 clients were vaccinated.
- **E.** A Nurse conducted Immunization training for child care workers on January 28, 2015 at the Southern Nevada Health District. There were 10 attendees.
- F. Child Care site visits were conducted in January. 32 child care workers were vaccinated.
- **G.** In partnership with Roseman College, staff conducted an immunization clinic at the Science and Health Fair at the Monaco Middle School in North Las Vegas on January 10, 2015. 70 clients were vaccinated.

### II. Community Health Nursing Program

### 1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

A. Three classes were provided at two different facilities by the Child Care Health Consultants (CCHC) in January 2015.

B. There was no new lead cases in January 2015.

### 2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has enrolled 590 low income, first time mothers since its inception in 2008. At present, the six Nurse Home Visitors are serving 144 clients. 56 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA).

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership is one of the evidence-based home visiting program sites participating in the national Maternal and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation (MIHOPE) - Strong Start, a study designed to assess the effects of home visiting services on maternal and infant health. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) may use the results of the evaluation to help formulate Medicaid reimbursement policies. 66 clients are now enrolled in the Strong Start study. The District's Nurse-Family Partnership program is committed to enrolling 150 study participants through September 2015.

# III. Office of HIV/AIDS/STD-Prevention, Care, Surveillance

## 1. Prevention Services/Community Activities

### 2. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

During January, staff continued to work diligently to prepare for implementation of the Electronic Medical Record System, Netsmart. Staff have attended day long trainings to orientate to the EMR. Additional issues were identified during these sessions requiring more work on the system before implementation can be considered.

#### 3. Surveillance

In the month of January, the surveillance team has searched 1400+ HIV out-of-care cases for a physical address and/or labs (done in the past year) that might have not been reported for various reasons. Cases with no new lab or with no verification on relocation were processed in TriSano for field investigation. We have continued to monitor labs reported from laboratories and providers, conduct chart reviews, Chlamydia and Gonorrhea phone interviews (as required), make state/CDC calls to follow up on OOJ records, Identify OOS HIV cases (CDC) and assist the DIIS with record searches (Labs or physical address of clients). We are working on surveillance data validation and documentation process and will continue to update our standards.

### IV. <u>Tuberculosis Clinic</u>

1. TB Clinic/Surveillance Activities

A. Medical Center Update: Screening for all potentially exposed clients, staff, students and family

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members is ongoing at this time, infant surveillance will continue for another month.

- **B.** Contact investigation on-site testing occurred at a local high school for case diagnosed in December 2014.
- **C.** Outreach Activity: Ongoing outreach events conducted at numerous Clark County Medical Centers/Hospitals.
- 2. There was 8 new active cases reported in January 2015.
  - A. 8 new Adult cases
    - a. 1 USA Male
    - b. 4 Foreign Born Female
    - c. 3 Foreign Born Male
  - **B.** No new pediatric case reported in January 2015.

### V. <u>Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)</u>

# 1. Special Projects, Reports/Events

- A. On January 10, 2015, TPP staff participated in a Health Fair hosted by Monroe Middle School. Staff outreached to over 100 youth and provided them with sexual health information and community resources.
- B. On January 21, 2015, TPP staff participated in the MCH Health Symposium on Youth Development with over 100 Health Care Professionals in attendance. Staff presented on Youth Development: Positive and powerful effects of youth engagement.
- C. During the month of January, the TPP staff scheduled 20 birth control appointments for teens. 13 appointments were completed.
- D. During the month of January, TPP staff held an outreach at the following six high schools (Cheyenne, Legacy, Mojave, Chaparral, Las Vegas, El Dorado), reaching a total 429 youth.
- E. During the month of January, the TPP program's social media campaign reached a total of 3,492 unique new visitors on the condomsensenv.com website and 226 new likes on the TPP's Facebook page.

#### **VI. Family Planning Summary**

Recruitment efforts continue now into the seventh month for a second Nurse Practitioner in Family Planning. The recruitment also includes Physicians Assistants. Discussion is being held regarding establishing a competitive salary range for these positions; mid level provider are currently highly sought commodities in the medical community. It is critical for Family Planning to have adequate APRN staffing to assure we can meet the needs of our community and the grant anticipated numbers of clients served. Currently due to APRN shortage, the East Las Vegas appointment wait time to be seen by the sole APRN is 5 weeks. This impacts a potentially vulnerable population who may desire to initiate birth control to prevent an unwanted pregnancy.

Henderson Family Planning services are now limited to services not requiring examinations such as Birth control refills, pregnancy tests, emergency contraception, limited STD testing and counseling. The East Las Vegas remains capable of providing full services for FP clients. Henderson clients are being referred to East Las Vegas for examinations.

Family Planning is proposing to initiate a male services program (males will primarily be seen by nurses, not APRN's) at ELV. The goal is initiation of this program in May 2015. This will provide a broader scope of services in the local community, link with the education provided by TPP to teens by providing an additional location for male teens for STD testing and education related to STD/HIV prevention and teen pregnancy prevention.

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Southwest Medical Associates has moved in and opened a fully functioning outpatient clinical services office immediately next door to the East Las Vegas clinic. Currently they offer primary care services. Within the month, in the same complex, they will additionally be offering OB/GYN services and Pediatrics. Southwest Medical, like SNHD Immunizations and Family Planning, serves Medicaid HPN (Smart Choice) and State Medicaid clients.

### VII. Nursing Administration

### 1. Student Interns

A. Nevada State College and UNLV students began their clinic rotations in January.

### 2. CPR Training

A. Staff is current on CPR training through January 2015.

### 3. CEU Educational Opportunities

A. Nursing will continue to retain Nevada Nursing Board approval to provide Continuing Education credits for District nurses.
