Flu clinics and cancer screening services combined to reach target audience

(Las Vegas, Nev., - October 6, 2003) – For the first time the Clark County Health District will combine two programs – flu clinics and the Women's Health Connection – to reach women who are more at risk from complications from the flu and less likely to access cancer screening services.

"Since many of the women who attend our flu clinics fit the profile of women we reach out to through Women's Health Connection our staff recognized the opportunity to combine resources and also provide cancer screening services and information," said Dr. Donald Kwalick, chief health officer for the district.

FLU SHOTS

The flu shot is recommended every fall for all people age 50 or older; women who will be in their 2nd or 3rd trimester of pregnancy during flu season; residents of long-term care facilities; people younger than 50 who have medical problems such as heart or lung disease (including asthma), diabetes, kidney disease or an immune system weakened by disease or medication; and those who work or live with any of these individuals. This year, recommendations also include otherwise healthy children age 6-23 months because they are at risk for influenzarelated hospitalization. Vaccination of children less than 6 months old who have certain medical conditions continues to be strongly recommended.

Flu clinics will be held throughout the month of October, which is also Breast Cancer Awareness Month. (See attachment for schedule of clinics and costs.) For more information about flu clinics the public may call 383-1351.

Methods of payment for flu shots include Medicare Part B, Medicare Railroad Part B, Medicaid, Secure Horizons and Senior Dimensions. Patients must present their insurance card or Medicaid voucher at the time of service. For those not covered, or without proof of insurance, the cost is \$20.

Pneumonia and Tetanus

The pneumonia and tetanus vaccination will also be available at the flu clinics. Usually one dose of pneumonia vaccine is all that is needed. However, a second dose may be recommended for those people aged 65 and older who received their first dose when they were under 65, if five or more years have passed since that dose, or those with special medical conditions.

Methods of payment for pneumonia vaccine are Medicare Part B and Medicare Railroad Part B (for those who qualify) and Secure Horizons and Medicaid. Patients must present their insurance card or Medicaid voucher at the time of service. For those not covered, or without proof of insurance, the cost is \$25.

A tetanus booster is recommended once ever 10 years for adults. Tetanus shots are available for a charge of \$15.

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
