DIVISION OF NURSING DIRECTOR REPORT

I. Immunization Program

1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- **A.** Immunization Clinic at Laughlin Junior/Senior high on November 13, 2015 with 17 clients receiving 28 vaccines.
- **B.** Immunization Clinic staff is offering Tdap, HPV (Gardisil), flu and State funded Twinrix, Hepatitis A and Meningitis vaccines at The LGBTQ Center on Mondays and Wednesdays. A total of 55 clients received 127 vaccinations.
- **C.** Immunization Clinic staff received educational information about Healthy Start program referrals on November 17, 2015.
- **D.** First WEBIZ level 3 vaccine inventory reconciliation conducted on November 30, 2015 went well since its implementation in October.

2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- A. SAPTA staff offered flu and adult vaccines at Shannon West Youth Center. 7 adults received 19 vaccines.
- **B.** Child Care staff offered flu and Tdap vaccine at Creative Kids. Staff and families. 10 adults received 16 vaccines.
- **C.** SAPTA staff offered flu vaccine at Westcare-Harris Springs Ranch. 8 adults received flu vaccines.
- **D.** In partnership with Roseman University, staff conducted an adult clinic at the Senior Health Fair at Roseman University. 21 clients received 30 vaccines.
- **E.** In partnership with UNLV Nursing Program and Volunteers in Medicine of Southern Nevada, staff conducted a flu clinic at Ruffin Family Clinic. 23 clients received flu vaccine.
- **F.** Staff and Roseman Nursing/Pharmacy students conducted an Immunization Clinic at Project Homeless Connect at Cashman Center. 89 clients received 257 vaccines.
- **G.** Staff and UNLV Nursing students conducted a flu clinic at the Give Thanks Health and Wellness Fair at 7th Day Adventist Church. 49 clients received flu vaccine.

II. Community Health Nursing Program

1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

- A. One class was provided at a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC) in November 2015.
- B. There were no new lead cases for the month of November.

2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 126 active clients. 41 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program has six Nurse Home visitors. Two are funded under the MIECHV program.

In November, the district's NFP program was recognized by Manpower Demonstration Research Corporation (MDRC) and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for its participation in the Mother and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation (MIHOPE), the largest and most comprehensive home visiting study ever conducted in the United States. The team was also recognized by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for their participation in the Mother and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation (MIHOPE)-Strong Start study, which examined the effectiveness of home visiting services on improving birth outcomes and infant and maternal health on the Medicaid population.

3. Healthy Start Initiative (HIS)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Healthy Start program has enrolled 121 at risk participants since March 2015, when enrollment began. 20 infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, the program coordinator/lead and three case managers are serving 86 participants.

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support a formal Communication and Outreach Plan to improve participant recruitment and retention in the program. Activities for this month included: training ACA Nevada Silver Exchange Market insurance navigators during open enrollment for recruitment of eligible program participants, and implementation of two contracts for marketing the Healthy Start program in the communities on buses and at bus shelters in the grant target zip codes. These advertisements will run through Thanksgiving, Christmas and the New Year holidays.

4. HIV Case Management

The Southern Nevada Health District's HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 96 clients in this month. There were no new pregnant women referred to the program and one baby was born perinatally exposed to HIV. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age. The RWPB site visit was conducted by the Office of HIV/AIDS – Bureau of Behavioral Health, Wellness, and Prevention from the Nevada Department of Public and Behavioral Health in October 2015 with no findings noted in terms of the case management program. Two RW Eligibility Specialists were hired in November and are orienting to the program. The vacant Nurse Case Manager position has is posted.

III. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

1. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

The Sexual Health clinic continued to host students in the month of November. A presentation on the HPV (Human Papillomavirus) vaccine was done by a group of 3 nursing students to all the SHC staff. They stressed the importance of the role of health care providers in improving HPV vaccine rates by educating parents and clients. The presentation was well received and a good opportunity for the students to do a group. Dr Roseanne Sugay has accepted the Sexual Health Clinic Medical Director position and we feel fortunate to have her leadership. The Ryan White Section within the SHC clinic will be preparing for a move to third party billing coming in December.

IV. Tuberculosis Clinic

- 1. There were 3 new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported in November 2015.
 - A. 2 adult cases were U.S. born
 - B. 1 pediatric cases
 - C. No TB education activities were conducted at local physician offices

2. Refugee Health Program

The Southern Nevada Health District's Refugee Health Program served 39 clients in this month. 64% required communicable disease follow-up. Four clients had two positive results each while two client had three communicable disease results. Clients served were from multiple countries/areas including (but not limited to): Cuba, South America, the Middle East and Africa.

V. Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)

The TPP program continues to work in partnership with grant partners towards completing training and program planning milestones as required by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH).

Special Projects, Reports/Events: Last month of Tier 1 A grant

- A. On November 12th, TPP staff held the first quarterly advisory board meeting. This group is comprised of community stakeholders and partners, with the goal of providing guidance and developing a community wide plan for teen pregnancy prevention.
- B. On November 13th, TPP staff in partnership with the Nevada Teen and Safety Coalition provided a parent workshop on "How to be an *askable* adult". The workshop was attended by 6 adults and it was held at Life Changing Solutions.
- **C.** On November 17th, TPP staff held the first quarterly youth leadership council meeting. This group comprised of youth from the grant's target population and it is tasked with providing guidance to the program.
- **D.** On November 16th and 17th, 2015, the TPP program supervisor attended the OAH Program Director Orientation Meeting in Washington D.C. At this meeting, attendees received detailed explanations on program requirements and deliverables.
- E. During November, under TPP program's social media campaign the facebook page received 18 new likes for a total of 6397 likes and 681 youth were engaged in it; twitter has a total of 500 likes and 168 views and the condom sense website had 2478 unique pages views.
- F. During November, TPP staff held outreach at the following four high schools (Rancho, El Dorado, Western and Las Vegas) and the Flamingo Juvenile Probation site, reaching a total 460 youth.

VI. Family Planning Summary

On November 3-4, 2015, two staff members of the Family Planning program participated in the first of nine Performance Measurement Learning Collaborative seminars designed to improve family planning quality assurance and program outcomes. During the first seminar, SNHD staff was I introduced to four best practices known to improve family planning program outcomes and the use of Plan, Do, Study, Act (PDSA) to implement improvements to the family planning programs.

In addition to participation in the Performance Measurement Learning Collaborative, the Family Planning program worked closely with the Finance Department to implement the use of "super bills" in the clinic to improve the collection of revenue from third-party payors. The full implementation of super bills in the family planning clinic began on November 30, 2015.

VII. Nursing Administration

1. Student Interns

A. Nevada State College, UNLV, Touro and Roseman students continue their clinic rotations for November.

2. CPR Training

A. Staff is current on CPR training through November.

3. CEU Educational Opportunities

A. Nursing will continue to retain Nevada Nursing Board approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD nursing staff.
