#### DIVISION OF NURSING DIRECTOR REPORT

# **Immunization Program**

#### 1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- A. 144 Pfizer infant/children electronic, telephonic reminder recalls were executed on January 15, 2016.
- B. The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with The Center has been extended to June 30. 2016 for staff to continue with their vaccinations of Tdap, HPV (Gardisil) and flu. The Immunization Clinic staff will resume services there on February 1, 2016.

### 2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- A Staff conducted an Immunization Clinic at the My Brother's Keeper Resource Fair on Saturday, January 23, 2016 at the Doolittle Community Center on 1950 North J Street, Las Vegas. 4 clients were immunized.
- B. SNHD Immunization Program was awarded a subgrant from the Nevada State Immunization Program's Nevada Adult Immunization Partnership & Improvement Project. This subgrant award will provide an Adult Immunization Outreach Nurse to participate in state efforts to improve immunization rates for vulnerable populations in Clark County.

## II. Community Health Nursing Program

### 1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

- A. One class was provided at a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC) in January 2015.
- B. There were 5 new lead cases for the month of January.

#### 2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

Currently has 132 active clients, 47 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program has 7 Nurse Home visitors. Two are funded by the

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MIECHV program.

The newest nurse home visitor began employment in January and is a rehire for the program. She is in the process of building her caseload. The program will once again have the capacity to serve a total of 175 families.

# 3. Healthy Start Initiative (HIS)

The Healthy Start program has enrolled 132 at risk participants since March 2015, when enrollment began. 27 infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, the four case managers are serving 96 participants.

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes.

# 4. HIV Case Management

The HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 88 clients in this month. There was one new pregnant woman referred to the program and no infants born perinatally exposed to HIV. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.

SNHD IMCM team was recognized by Dr. Iser at the Board of Health (BOH) meeting for their commitment to improving their agency's workplace and the health care system through their active participation in the Action Planning Group (APG). The APG is a team of HIV service providers who collaborate to assist clients living with or affected by HIV/AIDS.

A new Nurse Case Manager started in January, 2016. He is currently undergoing orientation.

# III. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

# 1. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

Sexual Health clinic staff worked proactively in January to systematically pack and prepare for the clinic move so as to minimize interruption in clinical service availability to the public. As a result, some Sexual Health Clinic staff serviced clients, who had already initiated a treatment regimen, out of the East PHC on January 26th, the day after the move. Meanwhile, in the new clinic, the remainder of the SHC staff unpacked and set up the new clinic. By doing so, SHC was the first clinic to be open and servicing clients in the new location beginning on January 27<sup>th</sup>. Reactions by the public to the new clinic and building have been positive

# IV. <u>Tuberculosis Clinic</u>

- 1. There were no new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported in January 2015.
  - A. 0 adult cases were U.S. born
  - B. 0 pediatric cases
  - C. No TB education activities were conducted at local physician offices

## 2. Refugee Health Program

The Southern Nevada Health District's Refugee Health Program served 25 clients in this month. 44% required communicable disease follow-up.

# V. <u>Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)</u>

The TPP program continues to work in partnership with grant partners towards completing training and program planning milestones as required by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH).

# 1. Special Projects, Reports/Events:

- A. On January 13<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup>, TPP staff and TPP grant partners received training on the evidence-based curriculum Sexual Health and Adolescent Risk Reduction (SHARP). This curriculum was selected for the new grant to be implemented in Juvenile Justice sites. A total of 13 facilitators were trained to implement this curriculum.
- B. On January 18<sup>th</sup>, TPP staff in collaboration with grant partners participated in the Martin Luther King parade. This event provided the opportunity to outreach to youth and the Las Vegas community. TPP staff provided information to over 100 youth and highlighted the TPP program to the Las Vegas community.
- C. On January 22<sup>nd</sup>, TPP staff provided technical assistance and training to grant partners on the topic of Sexually Transmitted Infections and HIV. This trainings are in line with SNHD's grant deliverables to train community facilitators to ensure medically accurate information is provided to the community.
- **D.** During January, under TPP program's social media campaign the facebook page received 29 new likes for a total of 6442 likes, 6482 individuals were reached and 79 youth were engaged in it; twitter has a total of 537 followers and 198 profile visits and 1176 impressions; and the condom sense website had 2061 unique page views.
- E. During January, TPP staff held outreach at the following four high schools (Las Vegas, Western, Cheyenne and Canyon Springs) reaching a total of 605 youth.

# **VI. Family Planning Summary**

During the month of January, family planning staff participated in training on the long acting reversible contraceptive, Nexplanon as part of the Performance Management Leadership Collaborative (PMLC). The provision of long acting reversible contraceptives (LARC) is a best practice recommendation from the PMLC. The family planning program will add Nexplanon as an additional birth control method available at SNHD clinics within the next 30-60 days.

Plans for expanding family planning services at the new 280 S. Decatur facility are temporarily on hold until March or April 2016. This is due to current clinical and administrative staffing shortages in the family planning program.

## VII. Nursing Administration

#### 1. Student Interns

A. Nevada State College and UNLV students continue their clinic rotations for January.

## 2. CPR Training

A. Staff is current on CPR training through January 2016.

## 3. CEU Educational Opportunities

A. Nursing will continue to retain Nevada Nursing Board approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD nursing staff.
