Emergency Medical Services Regulations Section 1100.200 "Staffing:

Operation of Firefighting Agency Vehicles"

I. **BACKGROUND:**

Clark County Fire Department (CCFD) requests a Variance to Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Regulations Section 1100.200 to allow volunteers who do not hold an attendant license to operate an emergency vehicle for their rural fire departments located in Blue Diamond, Bunkerville, Cal-Nev-Ari, Cold Creek, Goodsprings Indian Springs, Logandale, Moapa, Mountain Springs, Mt. Charleston, Overton, Sandy Valley, and Searchlight. CCFD requests a Variance because of a critical shortage of volunteers in the rural communities.

Per NRS 450B.260 (Attachment D) the Board may prescribe lesser qualifications for specific geographical areas such as the rural communities listed in paragraph I. CCFD assures SNHD that the volunteer drivers will be certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and use of the automated external defibrillator (AED). In addition, they will also be required to complete a Certified Emergency Vehicle Operations course prior to driving any CCFD vehicle. volunteer drivers will be utilized as a "driver only" and will not be permitted to provide patient care, with the exception of CPR and the use of an AED.

II. **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Southern Nevada Health District's (SNHD) Office of Emergency Medical Services & Trauma System (OEMSTS) has reviewed the application by petitioner CCFD requesting a Variance to EMS Regulations 1100.200. Based on the information provided in the petitioner's application, the SNHD OEMSTS staff recommends the issuance of a Variance with the provisions outlined above to allow the volunteer drivers to operate emergency vehicles, thereby enabling licensed attendants to provide lifesaving medical care which is often delayed or unavailable because of a lack of staffing. CCFD understands that the volunteers are prohibited from providing patient care, with the exception of CPR and use of an AED. We recommend that the Variance be issued for a two-year period. We believe the public health and safety, and the persons who may utilize the applicant's services would not be endangered by the issuance of this Variance.

Dear Mr. Hammond,

The Clark County Fire Department (CCFD), Rural Division, would like to request a variance from the requirements listed in Clark County Emergency Medical Service's section 1100.200 "Staffing: Operation of an Ambulance," wherein the attendant licensure for operating an ambulance would be waived as long as the Healthcare Provider CPR and emergency vehicle operations classes are completed.

The regulation currently requires that the driver of an ambulance be medically qualified and licensed at the Emergency Medical Technician level as a minimum. We would like to request that the ambulance driver requirements for a rural fire department ambulance being operated by volunteers be amended to include an operational variance for a rural division fire department member who is trained at the CPR/AED level. This change would continue to uphold the requirement set forth "staffed by not less than two (2) attendants," and at no time would the CPR/AED licensed attendant be responsible for care of the patient in the ambulance.

The CCFD is requesting this variance due to a critical shortage of volunteers in our rural communities. Many times a rural division ambulance cannot respond to a call for service because there is only one qualified EMT available. Personnel must then respond as "first responders" without the benefit of all their medical equipment. Often, there are members available who are certified at the CPR/AED level who could, if this variance is approved, drive the vehicle with the qualified attendant to the scene. All members of the rural division are required to complete a Certified Emergency Vehicle Operations course prior to driving any CCFD vehicle.

During the last 12 months we have strived to reach 100 percent certification of our members at the CPR/AED level. Several of our rural stations are maintaining this objective, but others that

are struggling with consistent membership are bringing our overall compliance to 80%. At no time would a CCFD vehicle respond without all members certified to at least the CPR/AED level.

We believe this variance would benefit the public we serve in these rural communities by allowing available personnel to respond to provide lifesaving medical care, which is often delayed or unavailable for up to an hour in some cases while an ambulance travels from Las Vegas to the rural area. This variance has been endorsed by all 13 CCFD rural fire chiefs and the CCFD EMS Division. Thank you for your consideration.

1100.200 STAFFING: OPERATION OF FIREFIGHTING AGENCY VEHICLES.

- I. Any Firefighting Agency Vehicle which is used to provide Emergency Medical Care shall be staffed by not less than two (2) Attendants.
- II. Any Firefighting Agency Vehicle which is used to provide Emergency Medical Care that can be provided by a licensed AEMT/EMT-I shall be staffed by not less than two (2) Attendants, at least one (1) of whom shall be Licensed as an AEMT/EMT-I.
- III. Any Firefighting Agency Vehicle which is used to provide Emergency Medical Care that can be provided by a licensed Paramedic/EMT-P shall be staffed by not less than two (2) Attendants, at least one (1) of whom shall be Licensed as a Paramedic/EMT-P.

NRS 450B.260 Operation of ambulance or fire-fighting vehicle used to provide medical care without licensed driver and attendant; exceptions.

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the public or private owner of an ambulance or air ambulance or a fire-fighting agency which owns a vehicle used in providing medical care at the scene of an emergency shall not permit its operation and use by any person not licensed under this chapter.
- 2. An ambulance carrying a sick or injured patient must be occupied by a driver and an attendant, each of whom is licensed as an attendant pursuant to this chapter or exempt from licensing pursuant to subsection 6 of NRS 450B.160, except in geographic areas which may be designated by the board and for which the board may prescribe lesser qualifications.
- 3. An air ambulance carrying a sick or injured patient must be occupied by a licensed attendant, or a person exempt from licensing pursuant to subsection 6 of NRS 450B.160, in addition to the pilot of the aircraft.
- 4. The pilot of an air ambulance is not required to have a license under this chapter.
- 5. A person who operates or uses a vehicle owned by a fire-fighting agency is not required to be licensed under this chapter, except that such a vehicle may not be used to provide intermediate or advanced medical care at the scene of an emergency unless at least one person in the vehicle is licensed to provide the care.
