## **DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT**

#### **Immunization Program**

#### 1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- A. Hope World Wide reminder recalls for children 19-35 months. 129 calls made by 1 Immunization Administrative Assistant for the month of April.
- B. Immunization clinic staff is offering Tdap, HPV (Gardasil) and flu vaccines at The (LGBTQ) Center on Mondays and Wednesdays in April. A total of 56 clients received 119 vaccinations.
- C. National Infant Immunization Week (NIIW) was April 16 to April 22. A kickoff event "Baby Bash" for NIIW was held at SNHD on Saturday, April 16, 2016. 102 clients received 242 vaccinations.

#### 2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- A. Immunization staff conducted Immunization Clinics at the following locations:
  - 1. G & L Center Health and Wellness Fair on April 12, 2016. 15 clients were seen. 37 vaccinations were administered.
  - 2. Homeless Youth Center on April 12, 2016. 4 clients were seen. 9 vaccines were administered.
  - 3. WIC Children's Health Fair at the Discovery Museum on April 16, 2016. 32 clients were seen. 97 vaccines were administered.
  - 4. Center for Behavioral Health on April 21, 2016. 3 clients were seen. 10 vaccines were administered.

#### 3. Immunization Recognition

A. Sarah Lugo received the Silver Syringe award for Outstanding Immunization Nurse (Southern Nevada) from Immunize Nevada. The Silver Syringe awards were established in 1998 as a way to celebrate Nevada's immunization and healthcare stakeholders. The annual awards event provides an opportunity to honor immunization champions who provide excellent service such as that modeled daily by Sarah.

# II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

#### 1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

- A. One class was provided to a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC) in April.
- B. There was one new lead case for the month of April.

#### 2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 153 active clients, 50 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program has 7 Nurse Home Visitors, two are with the MIECHV program.

#### 3. Healthy Start Initiative (HIS)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Healthy Start program has enrolled 185 at risk participants since March 2015, when enrollment began. 39 infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, the three case managers and team lead are serving 120 participants total

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes. The data collection system, *ChallengerSoft*, was launched and is being implemented by the team to track client demographics and program benchmarks. The program leadership and program evaluation teams attended training at the annual Healthy Start Regional Meeting in Portland, Oregon. Workshops topics included Maternal Child Health Title V goals/objectives, collective impact, HSI participant engagement, breastfeeding initiation, use of media for marketing and health equity.

#### 4. HIV Intensive Medical Case Management

The Southern Nevada Health District's HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 108 clients in this month. There were two babies referred to the program due to perinatal HIV exposure. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.

#### III. Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) (HIV and STD Care Services)

1. Sexual Health Clinic welcomes Lorretta Jennings as the new and currently only APRN. Lorretta has been training in April to service both walk in SHC clients and Ryan White clients.

The Ryan White section of the SHC launched a new Linkage to Care process in April and we continue to streamline the process, including scheduling and communication between the staff and disciplines that are involved in insuring Linkage to Care for newly diagnosed HIV clients or those who have been out of care. SHC staff was instrumental in the successful completion of the State of Nevada Lab inspection on April 6<sup>th</sup>.

The lab in the Decatur building is housed in SHC and manned with SHC staff but used by many programs. No deficiencies were found on this inspection. Alternatives for treatment of

Gonorrhea are being investigated for order due to notification of a national backorder of Ceftriaxone (recommended treatment).

#### IV. Tuberculosis Clinic

- 1. There were 5 new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported in April 2016.
  - A. 5 adult cases were U.S. born.
  - **B.** 0 pediatric cases.
  - C. No TB education activities were conducted at local physician offices.

#### 2. Refugee Health Program

The Southern Nevada Health District's Refugee Health Program served 47 clients in this month. 61% required communicable disease follow-up.

#### V. Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)

The TPP program continues to work in partnership with grant partners towards completing training and program planning milestones as required by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH).

## 1. Special Projects, Reports/Events:

- **A.** During April, TPP staff held outreach at the following five high schools (Rancho, Cheyenne, Sunrise, Cimarron and Western) reaching 527 youth; TPP staff also conducted four community outreach events providing information and resources to 264 youth reaching a total of 791 youth.
- **B.** During April, the facebook pages under the TPP program's social media campaign reached a total of 6,286 likes; 1252 individuals were reached and 83 youth were engaged in it; the twitter account had 358 profile visits and 2,561 impressions. The THNK website had 329 users and 395 page views.

#### **VI. Family Planning Summary**

On April 25, 2016, the family planning clinic located at 280 S. Decatur opened for services. Health examinations, cervical cancer screening, birth control, pregnancy testing and emergency contraception are available Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm. Opening this clinic offers a second location for clients seeking family planning services at SNHD.

The Family Planning Program was recently invited to participate in a Family Planning Sustainability Collaborative offered through the Office of Population Affairs (OPA) and the National Family Planning Training Center. The collaborative will train program staff on; managing resources, improving program financial performance, best practices redesign and quality improvement. This is the second in a series of national training programs that the SNHD Family Planning Program was selected to participate.

**A.** Nevada State College, Roseman and UNLV students continue their clinic rotations for April.

#### 2. CPR Training

A. Staff is current on CPR training through April 2016.
