DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT

I. Immunization Program

1. IMMUNIZATION CLINIC ACTIVITIES:

- A. Hope World Wide reminder recalls for children 19-35 months. 125 calls made by 1 Immunization administrative assistant for the month of May.
- **B.** Pfizer infant/children electronic, telephonic reminder recalls went out May 15, 2016. 124 calls went out.
- **C.** Immunization Clinic staff is offering Tdap, HPV (Gardasil), flu and State funded Twinrix, hepatitis A, hepatitis B and meningitis vaccines at The (LGBTQ) Center on Mondays and Wednesdays. A total of 62 clients received 117 vaccinations.
- **D.** An Immunization Clinic was held at the Laughlin Junior and Senior High Schools. A total of 7 clients received 19 vaccinations.

2. IMMUNIZATION OUTREACH ACTIVITIES:

Immunization Project Adult Immunization program staff conducted 3 clinics:

- 1. Family Connect Health Fair on May 7, 2016. 16 clients were seen. 27 vaccines were administered.
- 2. Center for Behavioral Health on May 12, 2016. 7 clients were seen. 18 vaccines were administered.
- 3. Westcare Clinic at the Duncan location on May 19, 2016. 12 clients were seen. 47 vaccines were administered.

II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

- 1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)
 - A. One class provided to a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC).
 - B. No new lead cases.

2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 155 first time

mothers in different phases of the program- pregnancy, infancy and toddler stage. 52 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program has seven Nurse Home visitors. Two are with the MIECHV program.

3. Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Healthy Start program has enrolled 199 at risk participants since March 2015, when enrollment began. 41 infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, the three case managers and team lead are serving 131 participants total.

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes. The data collection system, *ChallengerSoft*, was launch and is being implemented by the team to track client demographics and program benchmarks.

4. HIV Intensive Medical Case Management

The Southern Nevada Health District's HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 106 clients in this month. There was one new pregnant woman and one postpartum woman referred to the program, and one baby born perinatally exposed to HIV. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.

5. MCH Health Nursing Program Recognition

Nurse Family Partnership has been selected as one of 3 healthcare-related non-profit finalists for the Clark County Medical Society's Winged Heart Award.

III. Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) (HIV and STD Care Services)

 May was a busy month in the Sexual Health Clinic. Several new staff had the opportunity to attend trainings offered by the Office of Disease Surveillance this month. These included trainings to enhance staff knowledge of HIV and the development of skills in counseling affected clients.

IV. Tuberculosis Clinic

- 1. There were 2 new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported in May 2016.
 - A. 2 adult cases
 - B. 0 pediatric cases.
 - **C.** 1 each education activities were conducted at local physician offices.

2. Refugee Health Program

The Southern Nevada Health District's Refugee Health Program served 40 clients in this month. 70% required communicable disease follow-up.

V. <u>Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)</u>

The TPP program continues to work in partnership with grant partners towards completing training

and program planning milestones as required by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH).

1. Special Projects, Reports/Events:

- **A.** During May, TPP staff held outreach at the following five high schools (Rancho, Cheyenne, Sunrise, Cimarron and Western) reaching 527 youth; TPP staff also conducted four community outreach events providing information and resources to 264 youth reaching a total of 791 youth.
- **B.** During May, the facebook pages under the TPP program's social media campaign reached a total of 6,318 likes; 1364 individuals were reached and 254 youth were engaged in it; the twitter account had 320 profile visits and 5,189 impressions. The THNK website had 380 users and 380 page views. The Instragram page has 432 followers and 66 youth were engaged.
- C. During May 24 through May 27, TPP staff and grant partners (SAFY, Southern Nevada Children First and Planned Parenthood) became certified to implement the evidence-based intervention Families Talking Together. This intervention will provide parents with the necessary communication skills to talk to adolescents about delaying sexual debut.

VI. Family Planning Summary

The Family Planning Program completed the final month of participation in the Performance Improvement Leadership Collaborative offered through the Office of Population Affairs. As part of the collaborative, the SNHD family planning program implemented four family planning best practices aimed at improving client access to moderately effective to highly effective methods of birth control. During the eight month improvement project, the SNHD family planning program was able to improve use of moderately effective to highly effective birth control methods from 81% to 93% and increase the use of Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives (LARC) to 16%. Staff from the SNHD family planning program will present these results to the PMLC in June 2016.

VII. Clinical Services Administration

1. Student Interns

A. Nevada State College, Roseman and UNLV students completed clinic rotations.

2. CEU Educational Opportunities

A. Clinical Services Division will continue to retain Nevada Nursing Board approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD Clinical Services staff.
