DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT

I. Immunization Program

1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- **A.** Hope World Wide reminder recalls for children 19-35 months. 201 calls made by 2 Immunization Administrative Assistants for the month of July.
- **B.** Pfizer Infant/Children electronic telephonic reminder recalls went out on July 15, 2016. 110 calls were made.

2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- **A.** An SNHD Immunization Informational Booth was held on July 9, 2016 at the Teen's Health Fair at the Boulevard Mall. SNHD Clinic information, Health and Wellness pamphlets and Childhood and Adult vaccine schedules were provided. Staff also evaluated Immunization records for attendees.
- **B.** An Immunization Statewide meeting was held in Reno on July 25 and July 26, 2016. Five Immunization Project Team Coordinators attended.
- **C.** An SNHD Adult Immunization Program Clinic was held at the Center for Behavioral Health on July 14, 2016. There were 3 clients and 5 vaccines administered.
- **D.** An Immunization Back to School Event was held in Moapa Valley on July 14, 2016. There were 68 clients and 161 vaccines administered.
- **E.** An Immunization Clinic was held at Catholic Charities on July 19, 2016. There were 19 clients and 61 vaccines administered.

II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

- A. One class provided to a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant.
- B. There was one new elevated lead case referral.

2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 152 active clients, 50 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)

Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program has five Nurse Home Visitors.

3. Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Healthy Start program has enrolled 238 at risk participants since March 2015, when enrollment began. 53 infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, the three case managers and team lead are serving 164 participants total.

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes. Ongoing participation and activities for the Ever Breastfed Peer Learning Network (PLN) continued this month: a quality improvement project plan was drafted and will be deliberated further at the Annual Healthy Start Convention in September 2016. The project collective impact task force-Family Community Action Network (FamCAN) had its quarterly meeting in which the group initiated steps towards creating focus and a shared goal for the asset map. Additional steps to configure the map will continue at next quarterly meeting in October 2016. The HSI team attended the training *Statutory Rape Awareness for Mandated Reporters* by the Nevada Public Health Foundation funded by the Division of Welfare and Social Services.

4. HIV Intensive Medical Case Management

The Southern Nevada Health District's HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 110 clients this month. There were four new pregnant women referred to the program and no babies born perinatally were exposed to HIV. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.

The new Administrative Assistant for the program began employment this month.

III. Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) (HIV and STD Care Services)

Facilities completed a comprehensive; stripping, cleaning and polishing of the clinic floor over two weekends in July.

IV. <u>Tuberculosis Clinic/Refugee Health Program</u>

- 1. There were 8 new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported to the Tuberculosis Clinic in July 2016.
- 2. The Refugee Health Program served 40 clients this month. 57% required communicable disease follow-up.

V. <u>Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)</u>

The TPP program and grant partners started full program implementation and grant activities in sites such as the Juvenile Justice System, Department of Family Services and other community based organizations in the community.

1. Special Projects, Reports/Events:

- A. During July, TPP staff held outreach at the Boys & Girls Club, Street Teens, Flamingo Juvenile Probation Office and participated in Teen Health Fair sponsored by The University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Through these outreach activities, TPP reached 177 youth.
- **B.** During July, the facebook pages under the TPP program's social media campaign reached a total of 6,248 likes and 19,828 individuals engaged in it; the twitter account had 2099 impressions. The THNK website had 383 users and the Instagram page has 457 followers and 101 youth were engaged.

VI. Family Planning (FP)

The Family Planning program exceeded their goal of serving at least 1550 unduplicated family planning clients in the first quarter of the grant year. As of July 1, 2016, the Family Planning program served 1,688 unduplicated clients 108% of their quarterly goal.

The Family Planning program continues to see increased client requests for long acting reversible contraceptives (LARC) for birth control. In July 2016, nearly 17% of all SNHD family planning clients chose a LARC method for birth control. This is due in part to the addition of the hormonal implant, Nexplanon to the family planning formulary in April 2016.

VII. Clinical Services Administration

1. Student Interns/Clinical Rotations/Medical Residents

- A. Nevada State College students will begin Clinical Services rotations in August.
- B. Roseman University will start rotations in September.
- **C.** Hosted 2 Medical Residents throughout the various clinics.

2. CEU Educational Opportunities

- 1. Clinical Services Division will continue to retain Nevada State Board of Nursing approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD Clinical Services Nursing staff.
- 2. Clinical Services Administration is exploring opportunities to provide MD/DO continuing education credits.
- 3. Clinical Services Administration is exploring opportunities for Clinical Workforce development through simulated lab experiences.
