RE: DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT

I. Immunization Program

1. Immunization Clinic Activities

- A. Staff attended the Annual Immunization Competency training. A total of 51 workforce members attended 3 trainings. Nurses received 1 CEU for attending.
- B. The Back to School Saturday Clinic held at the Main Immunization Clinic on August 27, 2016 from 9:00-1:00pm served 152 clients and 382 vaccinations were administered.
- C. During the 2016 Back to School month of August, SNHD Immunization Clinics served 10,268 clients

2. Immunization Outreach Activities

- A. At the Culinary Back to School Event held at Cashman Center on August 6, 2016, staff Served 287 clients, reviewed 166 Immunization records, and 590 vaccinations were administered.
- B. At the Pearson Community Center Immunization Clinic on August 13, 2016, staff served 7 clients and 15 vaccinations administered.
- C. At the WIC Urban League Center Immunization Clinic on August 16, 2016, staff served 20 and 54 vaccinations administered.
- D. A Back to School Immunizations Clinic was held at Robert Price Community Center on August 20, 2016 serving 3 clients and administering 7 vaccinations.

II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

1. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

- A. One class provided to a child care facility by the Child Care Health Consultant.
- B. There were no new elevated lead case referrals.

2. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The SNHD Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 131 active clients. 46 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) made available through the NV Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA).

The SNHD Nurse-Family Partnership participated in the Nurse-Family Partnership National Site Visit Week August 15-19, 2016. The primary objective including educating policymakers and community partners about the local NFP program and its positive impact on the community. Representatives from the offices of Harry Reid, Dean Heller, Dina Titus, Joe Heck, and Cresent Hardy participated in the Site Visit. North Las Vegas Mayor John Lee and LeQwan McDowell, a member of SNHD's Advisory Board, also participated. Two NFP families shared their experiences with the program.

3. Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)

The SNHD Healthy Start program has enrolled 240 at risk participants since enrollment began March 2015. Fifty-five infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, two case managers and team lead are serving 154 participants total. The program is actively recruiting two additional case managers.

The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HIS) team continues ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes. The HSI team attended the training *Baby Behaviors Training* by Dr. Jane Heinig of the University of California Davis-Human Lactation Center hosted by Nevada State WIC. The Project Coordinator was also awarded a scholarship to be trained as a Certified Lactation Counselor-training and certification forthcoming. Outreach efforts this month included program participation at two Breastfeeding awareness events: Baby's R US Celebrates Breastfeeding for military families and Las Vegas Urban League WIC Celebrates World Breastfeeding.

4. HIV Intensive Medical Case Management

The SNHD HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program served 129 clients in August. There were no new pregnant women referred to the program and two babies born perinatally exposed to HIV. Newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.

On August 10, 2016, the SNHD HIV Intensive Medical Case Management (IMCM) program organized the Ryan White Part A All Provider Showcase. A full day was dedicated to building stronger collaborations among providers in an effort towards positive collective impact.

Nurse Case Managers attended the Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) training to learn universal screening for the severity of substance abuse, and interventions and referrals to appropriate resources.

III. Sexual Health Clinic (SHC) (HIV and STD Care Services)

Dr. Rosanne Sugay, SHC Medical Director and Ryan White Program Clinical provider, received the Exemplary Service Future Leader Award at the 2016 Nevada Summer Institute. Dr. Sugay also attended the Special Projects of National Significance conference.

SHC nurses received training on a new 4th generation Rapid HIV antibody/antigen test called Determine. SHC will start utilizing this test once all prior tests kits have been exhausted.

Most members of the Ryan White Services team in the SHC attended an all day Ryan White provider showcase that allowed for understanding of various community providers roles in the HIV care community and for networking.

A SHC Social Worker and APRN attended a training on screening, brief intervention and referral to treatment (SBRIT) for substance use/abuse at the Clark County Government Center.

Interviews for the Community Health Nurse position were completed and successful with a new

Community Health Nurse joins the SHC-team mid-September. Recruitment for an Administrative Assistant will continue.

IV. <u>Tuberculosis Clinic/Refugee Health Program</u>

- 1. There were 3 new active adult cases and no pediatric cases reported to the Tuberculosis Clinic.
- 2. The Refugee Health Program served 61 clients, 32 of these clients (53%) required communicable disease follow-up.

V. <u>Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)</u>

1. Special Projects, Reports/Events:

- A. TPP staff held outreach at the East Las Vegas, Doolittle and Pearson Community Centers, Leaders of the Future and Child Heaven. Through these outreach activities, TPP reached 504 youth.
- **B.** On August 12, TPP's Youth Leadership Council co-hosted a youth conference with the theme of Expect Respect. In addition to co-hosting, the youth facilitated a workshop on the topic "sexting" and bullying through social media.
- C. The facebook pages under the TPP program's social media campaign reached a total of 6,213 likes and 6,029 individuals engaged in it; the twitter account had 1,126 impressions. The THNK website had 323 users and the Instagram page has 481 followers and 8 youth were engaged.

VI. Family Planning (FP)

The Family Planning Program services continued at both the East Las Vegas and Decatur Public facilities without an interruption in services during to back-to-school activities resulting in an increase of 85% in services compared to 2015. The East Las Vegas family planning clinic served 445 unduplicated clients and the Decatur Family Planning clinic served 247 unduplicated clients during the month of August.

VII. Clinical Services Administration

- 1. Student Interns/Clinical Rotations/Medical Residents
 - A. Nevada State College students began scheduled Clinical Services rotations.
 - **B.** SNHD Hosted 3 Medical Residents throughout various clinics.
 - C. Roseman Pharmacy students began scheduled Clinical Services rotations.

2. CEU Educational Opportunities

Renewal application for CE provider status was approved by the Nevada State Board of Nursing. Clinical Services Division will continue to retain Nevada State Board of Nursing approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD Clinical Services Nursing staff.
