DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT RE:

١. Immunization Program

A. Immunization Program Activities

- 1. Two Immunization staff members were recognized at the Silver Syringe Award on April 27, 2017, at the Las Vegas Country Club. Mee Kee Chong-Dao received Outstanding Immunization Champion and Lynda McCloskey received Outstanding Immunization Nurse.
- 2. National Infant Immunization Week (NIIW) was April 24 through April 28, 2017. A finale event "Baby Bash" was held at the Decatur Immunization Clinic on Friday, April 28, 2017. There were 27 community partner vendors who participated. A total of 403 vaccines were administered to 176 clients.
- 3. Hope World Wide program provided 65 successful reminder recalls for children 19-35 months old.
- 4. Initiated adult immunization reminder recalls via postcards and phone calls through Televox for those 65 years and older with no doses of Prevnar, shingles and/or Td/Tdap within the last 10 years. A total of 1,625 postcards sent and follow up phone calls were made.

B. Immunization Outreach Activities

- 1. Immunization services at The Center (LGBTQ) on Mondays and Wednesdays administered 49 vaccinations to 31 clients
- 2. Hartke Park Outreach Clinic was held on April 6, 2017 and administered 50 vaccinations to 26 clients.
- 3. Health Fair at The Center was held on Saturday, April 8, 2017 and administered 23 vaccinations to 13 clients.
- 4. Mexican Consulate Clinic was held on April 17, 2017 and administered 94 vaccinations to 53 clients.
- 5. WIC clinic at Springs Preserve on April 19, 2017 and administered 21 vaccinations to 12

clients.

6. The Adult Immunization grant provided Tdap vaccinations to 6 clients on April 28, 2017. Vaccine education was delivered to 74 clients.

II. Maternal Child Health Nursing Program

A. Child Care Health Consultation (CCHC)

The CCHC is provided by a specially trained community health Registered Nurse with knowledge in mental health, nutrition, health education, oral health, cultural diversity, early brain and child development, and Early Childhood Education health and safety issues. The CCHC's basic function is to enhance the quality of Early Childhood Education programs by promoting optimal health and safety standards. The Maternal Child Health nurse is the trained CCHC and provides these services.

- There was one new childhood lead poisoning case identified this month.
- 2. There were two referrals from the Newborn Screening Program requiring follow-up by the field nurse.
- 3. The MCH Nurse/Child Care Health Consultant retired effective March 31, 2017.

B. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 128 active clients. 55 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA).

The program has five Nurse Home Visitors. A nurse consultant from the National Service office conducted a site visit in April; only 3.5% of the areas (2 out of 56) were identified as needing improvement. The team also received training from McMaster University's Susan Jack as a follow-up to the Intimate Partner Violence research project that the group participates since 2011.

C. <u>Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)</u>

- 1. The HSI has enrolled 321 at risk participants since March 2015. Eighty eight infants have been born into the program during this period. At present, two case managers and one team lead are serving 117 active participants.
- The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes.
- 3. The HSI Project Director and Project Coordinator attended the National Healthy Start Association 2017 Spring Conference-Championing Equity in Our Communities. This conference also included Healthy Start Initiative Grantee meetings with topics on MCH-Healthy Start Division updates, HSI evaluation plan, COIIN project updates, as well as a town hall with the Bureau Director Dr. Michael Lu. Outreach for the Healthy Start project continues with ongoing contacts in the community and WIC satellite sites. Events attended this month

included the Southern Nevada Breastfeeding Summit, Macedonia Baptist Church Health and Wellness Fair and the SNHD-National Infant Immunization Week Baby Bash. The project hired a new Nurse Case Manager; this was its last remaining vacancy, and now the project is fully staffed.

III. HIV/Ryan White Programs

- A. The HIV-Intensive Medical Case Management (MCM) program served 110 patients this month. Two pregnant women were referred to the program and two babies were born with perinatal exposure to HIV. Exposed newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.
- B. Ryan White program staff members either attended, or are scheduled to attend, trainings in Harm Reduction and Stigma to better prepare them to provide patient-centered care that addresses the disproportionate burden of HIV infection and health outcomes in population served.
- C. Last year's Ryan White Part B grants (2016-17), through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health, were closed out in April 2017. The Referral for Health Care and Supportive Services grant is funded again for next grant year 2017-18, while the Medical Case Management and Treatment Adherence grant was not funded, resulting in a loss of 1.5 FTE nurse case manager position for the Ryan White team.

IV. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)

- A. APRN interviews were done (2). A decision to expand selection pool was made so positions will be posted for recruitment again.
- B. Staffing shortage in the clinic continues to impact the provision of services in a timely manner yet the staff serviced 1,099 clients due to excellent team work.
- C. Shortage of Bicillin, utilized to treat Syphilis, announced by manufacturer is not expected to impact SHC due to the quantitiy on hand and the ability of the Immunization program to secure additional doses for SNHD.

V. Tuberculosis Clinic/Refugee Health Program

- A. Two new active adult cases and no new pediatric cases were reported to the TB Clinic.
- B. The Refugee Health Program served 50 clients with 13 clients (26%) requiring communicable disease follow-up.

VI. Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)

A. Special Projects, Reports/Events: TPP staff held outreach activities at canyon Las Vegas High School, Sunrise Mountain High School, Desert Pines High School, El Dorado High School, Dessert Pines High School, Canyon Springs and Flamingo Juvenile Probation site. On April 1st, 2017, TPP Youth Leadership Council member participated in a Health Fair sponsored by Immunize Nevada at the West Sahara Library. On April 4th, TPP staff participated in Jobs for America's Graduates College and Career Fair. In total TPP reached 1045 youth. On April 18th,

- the TPP Advisory Board continued with its community education and mobilization campaign with the mailing of 107 education packages to community and political leaders.
- B. During April, through the TPP program's social media campaign the THNK Nevada Facebook page reached a total of 6,225 likes and 13,315 individuals were engaged in it. The twitter account reached 674 followers and had 1,886 impressions. The THINK website had 192 unique users, 86 new users and 18 returning users and the Instagram page reached 579 followers and 52 youth were engaged.

VII. Family Planning (FP)

- A. FP Program services at East Las Vegas and Decatur Public Health Centers served a total of 593 clients. 577 which were unduplicated.
 - 1. The East Las Vegas family planning clinic served 360 clients (368 unduplicated clients).
 - 2. The Decatur family planning clinic served 217 clients (225 unduplicated clients).
 - 3. Family Planning had a successful site review during the Title X site visit on 4/11- 4/13.
 - 4. Family Planning participated in the Financial Management Learning Collaborative on 4/18/17 in Washington, DC.

VIII. Clinical Services Administration

- A. Chamberlain, Nevada State College, Roseman University and Touro University and University Nevada School of Medicine had scheduled SNHD Clinical Services rotations for April.
- B. CEU Educational Opportunities: Clinical Services Division continues to retain Nevada State Board of Nursing approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD Clinical Services Nursing staff. There were no CEU's provided for the month of April
