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**RE: DIVISION OF CLINICAL SERVICES DIRECTOR REPORT**

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## I. Immunization Program

### A. Immunization Program Activities

1. Televox reminder recall program provided 125 successful reminder recalls for children 6 weeks through 4 years old on May 15, 2017.
2. The first Back to School planning meeting with all of the key players was on May 10, 2017.

### B. Immunization Outreach Activities

1. Immunization services at The Center (LGBTQ), Las Vegas, on Mondays and Wednesdays provided 74 vaccinations for 40 clients.
2. Laughlin Clinic at the Junior/Senior High School on May 2, 2017 provided 28 vaccinations for 13 clients.
3. Adolescent clinic at Brinley Middle School, Las Vegas, on May 2, 2017, provided 37 vaccinations for 20 clients.
4. Adolescent clinic at Charles Hughes Middle School, Las Vegas, Mesquite on May 4, 2017, provided 48 vaccinations for 24 clients.
5. Adolescent clinic at Monaca Middle School, Las Vegas, on May 9, 2017, provided 36 vaccinations for 18 clients.
6. Adolescent clinic at Mack Lyons Middle School, Overton on May 16, 2017, provided 108 vaccinations for 54 clients.
7. Adult Clinic at the Mexican Consulate, Las Vegas, on May 15, 2017, provided 73 vaccinations for 38 clients.

## II. Community Health Nursing

### A. Maternal Child Health

1. There were no new childhood lead poisoning cases identified for the month of May.
2. There were two referrals from the Newborn Screening Program requiring follow-up by the field nurse.

#### **B. Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)**

The Southern Nevada Health District's Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) has 119 active clients. 52 are participating through the Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program made available through the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The program participants are being served by five Nurse Home Visitors.

#### **C. Healthy Start Initiative (HSI)**

1. The HSI has enrolled 361 at risk participants since March 2015., when enrollment began. Ninety-six infants have been born into the program since March 2015. At present, three case managers and one team lead are serving 153 participants.
2. The SNHD's Healthy Start Initiative (HSI) team has continued ongoing activities to support families in meeting project goals to improve women's health, increase access to quality services, strengthen families' resilience, achieve collective impact and monitor performance/outcomes. Presentations this month were provided for Department of Welfare and Social Services for Clark County Social Workers. The project has completed orientation of the fourth Nurse Case Manager and she is currently being assigned new participants.

### **III. HIV/Ryan White Care Programs**

- A. The HIV Case Management (MCM) program served 85 clients this month. Three new pregnant women were referred to the program and one baby was born perinatally exposed to HIV. Exposed newborns and infants are followed in case management for periodic HIV testing until cleared at approximately four months of age.
- B. HIV/Ryan White program Community Health Nurse Case Managers (NCM) gave a presentation to community partners about the role and functions of SNHD Ryan White programs, with emphasis on the NCM role in assisting clients with linkage to care and resources.
- C. HIV/Ryan White Program Nurse Case Manager attended Child Abuse training class.

### **IV. Sexual Health Clinic (HIV and STD Care Services)**

- A. Sexual Health clinic enacted a revised service delivery time for brothel workers May 1, 2017 and that is working well at present.
- B. All SHC nurses attended training on May 2, 2017 related to Suicide Awareness. We were very appreciative of our Division Director, Dr Leguen, for his support in the effort to arrange time for staff to attend this training. Ongoing education of staff is critical to maintain skills and knowledge. This training was an identified need.
- C. The APRN had an opportunity to shadow physicians at UMC Wellness to enhance her knowledge related to HIV care and services. She also attended the NASTD update on HIV transmission on May 11, 2017.
- D. The SHC Medical Assistant attended training on Child Abuse recognition and reporting. Staffing numbers for the volume of clients seen remains an issue in this clinic. Cross training efforts are being initiated.

### **V. Tuberculosis Clinic/Refugee Health Program**

- A. Three new active adult cases and no new pediatric cases were reported to the TB Clinic.

- B. The Refugee Health Program served 58 clients. Forty-three percent of these clients (25 out of 58) required communicable disease follow-up.

## **VI. Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP)**

- A. The TPP program and grant partners continue full program and grant activities at the Juvenile Justice System, Department of Family Services, and other community based organizations in the community.
- B. Special Projects, Reports/Events: TPP staff held outreach activities at Canyon Springs High School, Western High School, Cimarron High School, Cheyenne High School and Rancho High School. The staff conducted a prom outreach activity at Las Vegas High School. In total TPP reached 750 youth.
- C. During May, through the TPP program's social media campaign the THNKnevada Facebook page reached a total of 6,209 likes and 8,717 individuals were engaged in it. The twitter account reached 677 followers and had 1,056 impressions. The THINK website had 159 unique users, 100 new users and 12 returning users and the Instagram page reached 586 followers and 25 youth were engaged.

## **VII. Family Planning (FP)**

- A. FP Program services at East Las Vegas and Decatur Public Health Centers served a total of 627 clients; 596 of them were unduplicated.
- B. The East Las Vegas family planning clinic served 354 clients (340 unduplicated clients).
- C. The Decatur family planning clinic served 273 clients (256 unduplicated clients).
- D. Family Planning participated in the celebration of National Women's Health Week on May 15 - May 19, 2017. The promotion done by the Family Planning staff was recognized and appreciated by the Title X Regional Program Consultant and the Office of Women's Health team in Washington, DC.

## **VIII. Clinical Services Administration**

- A. Chamberlain, Nevada State College, Roseman University and Touro University and University of Nevada School of Medicine had scheduled SNHD Clinical Services rotations for May.
- B. Clinical Services Division continues to retain Nevada State Board of Nursing approval to provide Continuing Education credits for SNHD Nursing staff. There were no CEU's provided in May.
