. OFFICE OF CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION & HEALTH PROMOTION (OCDPHP)

Chronic Disease Prevention Program (CDPP)

In July, CDPP staff gave two presentations during the NACCHO (National Association of City and County Health Officials) 360 virtual annual conference. One presentation was a poster presentation on the Slam Dunk Health program at the as part of a Model Practice Program session. The Slam Dunk Health Program was selected as a Model Practice Program in May. Additionally, CDPP staff was invited by staff from U.S. Health & Human Services' Office of Disease Prevention & Health Promotion to co-present with them during a session on the Move Your Way program. CDPP staff shared information on the Move Your Way initiative in Southern Nevada.

As part of REACH-grant funded activities, the North Las Vegas (NLV) Planning Commission adopted and approved the amendments to the NLV Comprehensive Master Plan to include additional updates to promote active transportation and the Wayfinding Signage plan. The proposed amendments are set to go to the NLV City Council for final approval in August. The NLV Comprehensive Master Plan was also amended in February to include the updated Bike and Pedestrian Plan. Efforts in NLV are focused on promoting bike and walkability in downtown NLV through wayfinding signage and other efforts to increase activity-friendly routes.

CDPP staff worked with the director of the UNLV Food Pantry to draft a healthy nutrition standards policy. The policy was compared and aligned to the Three-Square Food Bank policy and shared with the CDC. The CDC provided a guidance document entitled "Food Service Guidelines in Food Pantries: Implementation and Evaluation, Additional Guidance for SPAN, HOP and REACH." The draft of the UNLV Food Pantry policy was compared to the CDC guidance document and is in alignment with CDC requirements for food pantries nutrition standards policies. The policy was fully implemented at the UNLV Food Pantry in January 2020, including the SWAP food ranking system. The policy was signed by the dean of The School of Integrated Health Sciences in July 2020.

Staff is assisting City of Henderson (COH) on their efforts to update their development code for convenience stores to include healthy food standards. CDPHP provided COH a list of convenience stores in Henderson along with contact information. CDPP staff also provided input into focus group questions and helped develop a plan for promoting and recruiting for the focus groups. A focus group with convenience store customers was held on July 13th and had 4 participants. Interviews with C-stores operators and owners are currently ongoing.

The Soda Free Summer (SFS)/Verano Sin Soda initiative launched in June. The initiative this year includes a partnership with promotoras and, due to the pandemic, includes mostly virtual or social media efforts. In July, activities included a webinar on the dangers of sugar-sweetened beverages provided in Spanish to 66 attendees and multiple social media posts in Spanish as well as multiple blogs in Spanish. In total, outreach efforts in July reached over 11,200 people. The initiative will run through August 14th.

Tobacco Control Program (TCP)

This month TCP staff developed a print ad promoting tobacco free lifestyles and tobacco cessation article in the only Native Hawaiian/ Pacific Islander publication in southern Nevada – Kama'aina Magazine. The publication reaches 15,000 individuals.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we have decided to transition our traditional in-person youth tobacco trainings to a virtual format. This month, planning and development to create a process, content and a mechanism for a virtual youth training occurred. Virtual youth training will be promoted and available year-round. The goal of the training is to increase awareness and prevent initiation of electronic vapor products and other emerging products. This month, 0 youth leaders were trained.

This month, the TCP implemented an online engagement and outreach event for teens called "You Got Skills." The activity used both local and national teen urban dance influencers to promote the vape-free lifestyle and increase awareness and shift norms related to tobacco use. This activity reached 29,643 teens.

Staff developed and launched a Latino tobacco cessation initiative called Por Mi, Por Ti, Por Nosotros Viva Saludable. This translates into For me, For you, For Everyone Live Healthy. The initiative will consist of traditional media, online sponsored ads and printed materials/ flyers/ brochures. All materials will promote the Nevada Tobacco Quitline.

Staff in conjunction with the American Lung Association have trained 632 healthcare providers to date on how to refer their patients to the Nevada Tobacco Quitline for assistance in quitting all tobacco product. Trainings occur in person and virtually.

3. Disease and Outbreak Investigations

2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19): As of September 1, SNHD had 59,857 cases and 1,157 deaths. The Health District activated the Incident Command System to expand our efforts in COVID-19 response and gain access to additional staffing and resources. The Health District continues to meet with the Clark County emergency managers, Fire, EMS, School Officials, hospital emergency response and infection control staff to communicate the current response and plan for continued partnership. The Office of Epidemiology and Disease Surveillance (OEDS) at SNHD is receiving and following up on reports of suspected and confirmed illness. conducting disease investigations, contact tracing, providing assessment and evaluation information, and working with local medical providers to determine levels of risk and recommended actions for anyone who may be ill or exposed. OEDS is monitoring travelers from high risk countries for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 to detect and confirm any cases in Clark County. OEDS is making recommendations of isolation and guarantine for individuals that are diagnosed with COVID-19 or have been identified as exposed to someone with COVID-19. OEDS and the Southern Nevada Public Health Laboratory are working in coordination with Clark County hospitals and other medical providers to provide guidance for testing and sample collection for Clark County residents and visitors. Contact tracing efforts include training and implementing additional contact tracers from the Environmental Health Program, Medical Reserve Corp, UNLV students, Clark County, and other partnering agencies. This is an ongoing response effort.

4. Non-communicable Reports and Updates

a. Naloxone Training: The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) awarded SNHD with the First Responders-Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (FR-CARA) grant in September of 2017. The purpose of this 4-year FR-CARA grant is to train and distribute naloxone to first responders and members of other key community sectors throughout Nevada to better respond to the large-scale burden of opioid overdoses. Trainings continue in Nye County communities, Tonopah, and numerous first responder, medical, and treatment organizations. OEDS has implemented a policy for SNHD staff to carry and administer Naloxone. OEDS has also been given permission at The Clark County Detention Center to place Naloxone in a person's property at the facility.

The following Naloxone trainings/distributions have taken place in the month of August:

8/11/2020 - Nevada Highway Patrol (150 kits distributed)

8/21/2020 - Westgate Security (5 trained, 130 kits distributed)

b. Overdose Data to Action Grant (OD2A): Due to COVID-19 response, there are no new updates.

B. Prevention - Community Outreach/Provider Outreach/Education

The Center and Huntridge Family Clinic have been successfully offering HIV/STD/PrEP/PEP services to the community since the reopening of the clinic.

OEDS staff is still working through the final phases of the Collect 2 Protect Project and the Home HIV Testing awareness project with Informatics.

C. High Impact HIV/STD/Hepatitis Screening Sites

Testing is currently being offered at TRAC B for HIV and Hep C. Also, The Center is offering screenings for HIV, Hep C, Gonorrhea, Chlamydia and Syphilis to the community Mon-Thurs from 1pm-5pm. AHF is also offering HIV and STD screenings at their clinic locations.

- E. Continue to enhance the iCircle web application for OEDS, and transmission of STD, HIV and Hepatitis testing data to CDC.
- F. Continue to support Clark County Coroner's Office (CCCO) on Cognos reports.
- G. Continue to work with OEDS on OD2A and SVM projects.
- H. Provide reports for FQHC and Clinical Services.
- I. Work with the state for the 2019 STD and NETSS data reconciliation.
- J. Enhance COVID-19 surveillance by automating COVID-19 hospitalization notification, and extract demographics, lab tests and treatment information from HIE CCDs for public health surveillance.
- K. Maintain and update COVID-19 dashboard, COVID-19 maps, lab testing and ED admission trend analysis and other urgent data requests.
- L. Maintain automate COVID-19 patient notification application and perform QA for contact tracing and identification.
- M. Maintain and enhance COVID-19 lab results portal. Clients are able to access their results online.
- N. Maintain applications to automate COVID-19 contacts upload and produce COVID-19 DECIPHER report.
- O. Continue to work with the state contractor (Deloitte) on development of contact tracing and tracking (CTT) system, and upload contacts into the CTT for contact tracing and testing referral.
- P. Upgrade Trisano server to adopt more contract tracers from AAA and UNLV for COVID investigation. Update Trisano forms for COVID MIS-C investigation.
- Q. Develop COVID investigation workload and data QA reports for SNHD, AAA and UNLV teams.
- R. Update SNHD COVID POD testing order and report system to ensure data completeness.
- S. Produce CDC ELC monthly grant reports.
- T. Join with NV HIE to apply "Strengthening the Technical Advancement & Readiness of Public Health via Health Information Exchange Program (HIE STAR)" grant.
- U. Recruiting new PHIS staff to enhance public health information systems.

IV. OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES & TRAUMA SYSTEM (OEMSTS)

A. Drug/Device/Protocol Committee (DDP)

The DDP Committee assists the OEMSTS, the Medical Advisory Board (MAB), and the QI Directors Committee in researching, developing, and editing new and existing protocols. Members include volunteer representatives from permitted agencies, receiving hospitals, and individuals involved with the training of EMS professionals.

The Committee discussed the need to revise the Stroke Protocol. The issue was tabled and will be forwarded to the QI Directors Committee for further discussion.

B. Medical Advisory Board (MAB)

The primary mission of the MAB is to support the Health Officer's role to ensure quality patient care within the EMS system by making recommendations and assisting in the ongoing design, operation, and evaluation of the EMS system from initial patient access to definitive patient care. The members include: 1) One medical director from each firefighting/franchised agency; 2) One operational director from each firefighting/franchised agency; 3) Chairman of the Regional Trauma Advisory Board; and 4) An employee of the District whose duties relate to the administration and enforcement of EMS Regulations as an ex-officio member.

The DDP Committee report was given to the MAB.

- 2. Out of Area defines compliance with EMS catchment zones. All EMS transports are protocol identified trauma patients delivered to a trauma center outside of their designated catchment zone.
- 3. Out of Area review threshold is 5% as was established by the Regional Trauma Advisory Board (RTAB). All data is reviewed by the RTAB on a quarterly basis. Current Out of Area overage is being evaluated by the RTAB as an ongoing perspective review of data.

V. OFFICE OF PUBLIC HEALTH PREPAREDNESS (OPHP)

- Planning and Preparedness: Following President Trump's directive, OPHP staff began working from home in support of the COVID-19 response. Manager, supervisor, senior planners, trainers, MRC volunteer coordinator, analyst and administrative staff may be serving in their SNHD and/or ICS positions in support of both SNHD and/or the MACC/MSST for the Southern Nevada community and hospital needs.
- Following SNHD leadership direction, all non-essential meetings have been postponed for staff to attend all essential COVID-19, SNHD, community partner, and hospital meetings.

PHP Training and PH Workforce Development

- 1. Following SNHD leadership direction, all non-essential training has been postponed focusing on the COVID-19 response and training needs.
- 2. Four New Hire Emergency Preparedness trainings were held by OPHP training staff and SNHD security.
- 3. Employee Fit Testing: Essential SNHD staff continue to receive respirator fit testing. 36 fit tests completed.

Hospital Preparedness Program (HPP)

- 1. 5 AUG OPHP attended the Training and Exercise Planning Workshop (TEPW) with the State of Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health. This allows OPHP to provide training information to the state for the next three to five years.
- 2. 6 AUG OPHP hosts the Southern Nevada Healthcare Preparedness Coalition utilizing a virtual platform mode of communication. Key subjects: Monthly All-Hospital Radio Test, Cancelled training at the Center for Domestic Preparedness, and the announcement of the upcoming Medical Surge BURN tabletop exercise in April of 2021.
- 3. 12 AUG HPP attended a webinar on the Great ShakeOut and COVID-19, how to get the most out of your training in the time of COVID-19. This webinar provided insight into training while in a social distancing environment.
- 4. 25 AUG OPHP participated in the State Division of Public and Behavioral Health's annual state site visit. With the issue of COVID-19 and social distancing, the state convened the site visit using Microsoft Teams. This was highly effective and allowed the local and state health departments to review grant deliverables from the previous budget period.

Grants and Administration

OPHP staff are supporting SNHD and MACC/MSST COVID-19 response and logistical needs.

Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) of Southern Nevada

MRC coordinator works in conjunction with SNHD and community partners for volunteers needed for the COVID-19 response.

- 1. MRC volunteers are still suspended from regular positions at SNHD Main and East Clinics, Foodhandler Safety Program, and Pharmacy due to restrictions of COVID-19. Medical and non-medical volunteers were deployed to four areas to support COVID response activities: Medical volunteers at community test collection sites; Laboratory Assistants are assisting SNPHL with test accessioning, kit assembly, and general assistance; Medical and non-medical volunteers are performing Contact Tracing at SNHD OEDS, and one volunteer with Office of Public Health Informatics. Total "accepted" volunteers grew slightly to 406. MRC Coordinator recruited, vetted, assigned, and deployed volunteers to all three sites. MRC Coordinator continues to recruit volunteers for test collection sites, OEDS, and SNPHL positions and participate in planning and operations meetings as available (see table below).

VI. VITAL RECORDS

August 2020 showed a 32% decrease in birth certificate sales in comparison to August 2019. Death certificate sales showed a 43% increase for the same time frame. SNHD received revenues of \$40,274 for birth registrations, \$27,885 for death registrations, and an additional \$8,794 in miscellaneous fees for the month of August.
