1: ACCESS TO CARE

- ▶ **VISION:** To increase equitable access to healthcare services in a manner that ensures citizens receive appropriate, affordable, high-quality, and compassionate care.

- ▶ **GOAL AREAS:**

 - ▶ **1.2: Healthcare Workforce Resources and Transportation**

IMPROVING COMMUNITY HEALTH-ACCESS TO CARE

- ▶ Mobile Health Collaborative
 - Provide Clinical Services to hard to reach/underserved populations
 - Mobile Clinic
- ▶ ECNS partnership with 911 dispatch
 - Refer callers with low-priority, non-emergency complaints to a nurse
- ▶ CHIPs partnered with Southern NV fire Depts
 - Referrals to SNV CHIPs



2. CHRONIC DISEASES

- ▶ **VISION:** To achieve a healthier population in Southern Nevada by reducing risks and behaviors that contribute to chronic disease.

IMPROVING COMMUNITY HEALTH-CHRONIC DISEASES

▶ Obesity

- Neon to Nature Mobile App downloaded 9,599 times as of end of Feb. 2018
- 50 CCSD Schools participated in Functional Fitness Program
- In June 2017, OCDPHP launched the 2017 Soda Free Summer (SFS) initiative.
- > 100 school gardens have been built in Clark County Schools

▶ Tobacco Usage

- 164 youth leaders were trained for youth-led prevention advocacy projects
- 15,104 healthcare and social service providers were trained on brief tobacco use intervention (BIT).
- 64 worksites or organizations voluntarily expanded their tobacco-free policies

Kathryn Barker and Jessica Johnson will speak on, "The role of local public health in the opioid epidemic."

The opioid epidemic is a major public health crisis in the United States. Local health departments can play an impactful role in addressing the epidemic on the front lines. This presentation will cover the factors driving this crisis (e.g., access to care, stigma, prescribing practices, etc.) and highlight how the Southern Nevada Health District has partnered with community agencies to address the issue. We will include an overview on assessment, data collection and analysis, prevention and public awareness, policy and advocacy, coalition and collaboration, bloodborne disease prevention associated with injection drug use, and harm reduction principles.

The Reality

SNHD is severely under-funded compared to health departments in the other 49 states and the national average. (4)

The Southern Nevada Health District, which serves the largest county in the state, **receives a disproportionate amount of funding to support the population.** (5)

Some of the key funding sources for Southern Nevada Health District **are inconsistent from year to year.** (6)

Understanding of the relationship between increased public health funding and improved public health is mixed. There is some evidence that the relationship varies among different communities. (7)

What can be done?

In order to open up new or improved funding resources, SNHD is working on new policy initiatives to generate increased, consistent funds to be used to promote public health in Southern Nevada. These policy initiatives seek to create more robust funding. Ideally, this funding will be allocated to SNHD through grants from various agencies and can expand the capabilities of SNHD while also positively impacting the health outcomes of our community.
